## Another Annoyance: Flash Cookies

Most everyone who regularly surfs the Internet is aware of “cookies”, those little snippets of information that are stored on the user’s computer to do useful things (like remembering bits of user information so it doesn’t need to be repeatedly entered) or do some irritating things (like spying on users to track their surfing habits for commercial gain).

As users visit various web sites, cookies are sent from the web site to the computer. Depending on the user’s privacy settings, the cookies are stored on the computer. As the user continues to visit sites on the web, the web pages received can update the cookie and send it back to the site that originally sent it to the computer – or a completely different site.

The latest versions of the most commonly-used web browsers have options that users can take advantage of to

control cookies. Those options allow user computers to delete expired cookies, remove all cookies placed on the computer during the current browsing session, or unilaterally delete every cookie on the computer. It seems like the cookie problem is under control. Or is it?

### **The difference between cookies and cookies**

As it turns out, the settings in the web browser only control “HTTP Cookies”.

The structure and behavior of HTTP Cookies have been defined. They are part of the core standards that define how the Internet and web browsers should operate. However, the technoweenies at Adobe came up with a better idea, creating an entity officially known as “Locally Shared Object”, but more commonly known as the “Flash Cookie”. (Flash® is a product that is marketed by Adobe) They can store approximately 25 times the amount of data in an HTTP cookie which makes them potentially more useful to web site architects. But there are some issues:

- Flash cookies don't go away by themselves. They don't have expiration dates. Only the Flash-enabled application that is aware of the existence of that specific Flash cookie will be able to delete it.
- Flash cookies are unaffected by privacy settings in the browser.
- Flash cookies are becoming more prevalent. It was reported last year that 54 of the top 100 web sites use Flash cookies (Western New York Law Center's web site does not use Flash cookies). The use of Flash cookies is increasing.
- Flash cookies can resurrect deleted HTTP cookies. Consider the following scenario: A user visits a web site. The site places an HTTP cookie and a Flash cookie on the computer. The user deletes the HTTP cookie (but the Flash cookie remains). Any time the user visits a site that looks for that specific Flash cookie, the contents of

the Flash cookie could be used to recreate the HTTP cookie.

- Flash cookies are miserable to delete. Web browsers cannot delete them. As a service to the public, Adobe has provided a method to remove them, but the opinion of the people who have gone to the two websites (yes, it requires a visit to two web sites) claim that is “confusing beyond belief”.

### Dealing with Flash cookies

Unlike the tools provided by Adobe to deal with Flash cookies, there are several simple, easy-to-use products available to computer users:

For users of Mozilla Firefox, the use of the BetterPrivacy add-on will automatically delete all Flash cookies every time the browser is closed. It can be downloaded from <https://addons.mozilla.org/en-US/firefox/addon/6623/>

If you have a lot of time on your hands, check out the Flash® web site. It claims to have information about the Flash Settings Manager that could help users to manage Flash cookies. The information can be found at [http://www.macromedia.com/support/documentation/en/flashplayer/help/settings\\_manager.html](http://www.macromedia.com/support/documentation/en/flashplayer/help/settings_manager.html).

The simplest solution of all can be found at <http://www.flashcookiecleaner.com/>. Go to the site and download the “Flash Cookie Cleaner” application. After downloading the app, just run it (There is no installation procedure). When the program runs, it will display the number of Flash cookies found. Click on “Delete Cookies” to delete them. It couldn't be easier.
